Our rector writes

You WhatsApp me on 07894 209833, or email me at revtimlaundon@ gmail.com or you could even write me a letter! We have our Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) in February this year. We used to have them in May but it always seemed to me a bit strange to be reviewing the past year when we were nearly at the midpoint of the current year. So, I've brought the APCMs forward this year, which has made the start of 2024 especially busy for me (!) but I think it makes more sense.

Last year I said I was hoping that 2023 would be a year of growth, as I reflected on the way that 2022 had been a year that was all about trying to recover from the pandemic.

I set out a number of types of growth (and I hope you can see that I want us to be outward looking churches that care about our local communities). As I said, I would love to see us:

growing in our faith

Dear friends

· growing in engagement with our local schools

• growing in kindness and compassion, expressing God's love in our community

- growing in our engagement with issues of justice and peace
- growing in our care of Creation

These hopes for our churches approximately match the "Five Marks of Mission," which set out the Church of England's understanding of the purpose of the whole Church, all around the world.

I also challenged both of our Parochial Church Councils (PCCs) to grow in three ways that relate to the future of our Benefice: 1) to grow in clarity of purpose, 2) to grow in financial resilience and 3) to be bold enough to say that we want our churches to grow numerically too. As I have been writing the reports to send off to the Diocese of Salisbury, I have felt a certain sense of pride in what we have achieved in 2023, because we've seen growth in every area.

To take just a few examples, we now have strong relationships developing with Wellington Eagles and Wellington Academy to compliment the strong relationship we already have with Castle Primary. We now have the Pastoral Visiting Team fully up and running, an ambition that I had when I first arrived, but one that was overtaken by Covid. At the start of 2023 a new local Environment Group was formed. Although this is a community group, the church was an integral part of this group being set up, as an expression of our desire to see nature and wildlife flourishing in our communities (because, as with all things bright and beautiful, the Lord God made them all!) Growing numerically and growing in financial resilience are a bit harder. However, we have seen both churches welcome new people, even if we have very sadly lost a couple of real stalwarts of the church in the last year. And we have made our first steps towards being lessreliant on subsidies from the Diocese of Salisbury because at the start of 2023 we were receiving a subsidy of approximately 50% of our ministry costs, whereas as we start 2024 this figure is now 45%. This is a small step, but it is a step in the right direction reflecting a lot of hard work and the tremendous generosity of the local people who support us. So thank you!

All in all, it has been a good year and we are look forward with hope.

Read Easy is a charity with over 80 groups in England, ours formed a year ago and so far have paired up eight Reader/Coaches who are making great progress!



1. Do you know a friend, relation, neighbour or employee over 18, who missed out on learning to read and would be keen to try our friendly, free, one-to-one Reading course?

No classrooms, just their own volunteer trained Read Easy Coach, dedicated to help them learn to read and with complete confidentiality, at a convenient venue.

2.4 million adults in England can barely read or not read at all. Interrupted schooling, health issues, dyslexia are only some of the reasons. Imagine not being able to read mail that comes to your door, medicine instructions, bills, timetables, street names, writing or answering texts or using email? Trying to hide this by pretending to have forgotten reading glasses, or feeling anxious that people are judging you.

Read Easy is a charity with over 80 groups in England, ours formed a year ago and so far have paired up eight Reader/Coaches who are making great progress! We fundraise with Council grants and other donations, to train our Coaches and buy all the resources for each Reader. Generously our Coaching venues are all sourced at no cost to us, like libraries, Church halls and offices. We have Coaches waiting to be paired!

Read Easy's vision is: "For all adults in the UK to have the literacy skills they need to realise their potential and live life to the full."

Please talk to anyone you know at home or work who might benefit from hearing about us. It takes a lot of courage and determination to try again, but we are dedicated to helping. If they are interested to find out more they can ring: 07942 382318 and leave a message, or if they agree you can contact us at : sewadmin@readeasy.org.uk

All we ask is that they are able to commit to regular two half hour sessions a week, at a suitable venue we find near them, and bring their enthusiasm and a desire to learn. In turn we offer:

• A trained one-to-one Read Easy Coach prepared to deliver a proven Reading programme, at the Reader's pace with respect, patience and good humour.

• A safe, vetted, confidential venue agreed with the Reader.

• All books and resources needed and the Coach's time, for free.

2. We are also looking for volunteers!

Our Salisbury drive has had a great response, now we are keen to hear from anyone local to Amesbury or Tidworth who would like to become a Reading Coach for new Readers coming forward in those areas.

3. Finally, our third wish is to find three new people for our Management Team:

• Secretary/Admin person, to keep us organised!

• A Venues Organiser, to take over the important role of sourcing and sustaining links with a wide number of venues who generously allow us to Coach and hold meetings for free.

NOTES FROM A BIBLE STUDY | ROS LEVERETT ...when resolutions are floundering

It's February : the traditional time for every New Year's resolution to be well and truly shelved, bandwagons fallen off and all that self improvement thoroughly abandoned! Maybe that's not you, in which case, congratulations. If it is you, you join me and many others in sometimes feeling the impossibility of making such changes in the cold of a winter's morning; why can't I make choosing right things stick?

The thing is that we as human beings are incapable of not messing up. Even if we are not messing up in a big way, we do often mess up in little ways. We find we can't manage to live without sometimes being mean, sometimes saying something that we shouldn't have, sometimes hurting other people, even those closest to us, that we love the most. That's not to let us off the hook in trying not to, but what we find is in little ways or big, our own selfishness or pride ruin things. It is a huge problem. In fact the Bible points at it as The Problem.

But do not despair! God knows you, loves you, and understands The Problem we all face, and has already implemented The Solution by sending His Son Jesus. On Christmas Day in church, we read Titus 3 v3-7.

(3) At one time we too were foolish, disobedient, deceived and enslaved by all kinds of passions and pleasures. We lived in malice and envy, being hated and hating one another. (4) But when the kindness and love of God our Saviour appeared,
(5) he saved us, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of his mercy. He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom (6) he poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Saviour, (7) so that,

having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life.

These four verses are like a mini-summary of the whole Bible. We are awful to each other. God our Saviour appeared. He has saved us because He is kind, loving and merciful.

He did it by sending Jesus, cleansing us from the awfulness through Jesus' death and giving us the Holy Spirit, and the hope of eternal life. But notice the big thing in verse 5! God does not save us because of the righteous things we have done. We do not earn or self-improve our way into His good books - that's not the way it works, and ultimately we cannot manage it anyway. All we can do is acknowledge when we mess up, and throw ourselves on God's mercy, love and kindness. If we do that, He will come through for us. In a world that expects self improvement and success to come from our own individual endeavour, it feels very tough when we 'fail'.

But God seeks to know and love you wherever you right now. He is not waiting until you are 'good' or 'going to church' or 'thin' or 'fit' or 'sober'. He is ready to support and hold you and be with you along the way as you seek to move ahead in life. Resolutions are all very well, but wherever you are with yours, do life with the God who loves you, and is your biggest champion.


wasted by going to landfill.



Hot Cross Bun Pudding

I was lucky enough to come across some yellow stickered hot cross buns in my local supermarket, and after forgetting about them for a further two days, I decided to get inventive when using them up. This is what I came up with! From Sam Welford-Goves

Ingredients

You will need:

A packet of hot cross buns (stale or otherwise) Butter for spreading (about 25g) 250ml full fat milk


Two eggs

A liberal tablespoon of sugar

Method

Start by cutting each bun in half, and spreading with butter. Reassemble the buns, and arrange in a dish (I used a small rectangular dish), then squish down a little so they are all nestled in. Next, mix together the eggs, milk and sugar until well combined and pour over the buns. Bake at about 180 degrees for 30-35 minutes, until the custard is set.
